#### **OVERVIEW**

This Fact Book is a publication of the SDCCD Office of Institutional Research and Planning for the San Diego Mesa College. It is designed to serve the information needs of the college community with a primary focus on student enrollment, demographics, and outcomes.

The Fact Book is a rich source of collegewide trend information that may be used for planning and decision making. The book contains the following five sections:

- 1) Headcount and Student Characteristics. Provides information on student demographic characteristics (e.g., age, ethnicity, and educational objective) over five years.
- 2) Persistence Rates. Provides information about first-time to college students who complete a fall term and enroll in the subsequent spring and fall terms. The information is also reported by demographic characteristics of interest.
- 3) Student Completion. Provides information on students' successful course completion rates, retention rates, GPA, awards conferred, and transfer volume. All of the information is provided in summary form, as well as by demographic characteristics of interest.
- 4) Productivity and Efficiency. Provides information on annual FTES, enrollment and fill rates, and load (WSCH/FTEF).
- 5) Human Resources. Provides information on the number of employees by employment type, ethnicity, and gender.

Each section contains the following benchmarks: 1) The percentage change or percent difference over the five year period being reported, 2) The collegewide average, and 3) The "All Colleges" in the District average (excludes Continuing Education).

# **Section I Headcount and Student Characteristics**

This section of the Fact Book contains student headcount by various student characteristics. The headcount figures are individual counts of students, or unduplicated headcount, based on official census counts at the end of the semester. Drops, never attends, and cancelled classes are excluded. The headcount information is reported over a period of five years to analyze trends and establish benchmarks. **Overall Headcount:** Unduplicated headcount for Mesa College increased 1431%, from 703 in Summer 2013 to 10,764 in Summer 2017. Unduplicated headcount for Mesa College decreased 7%, from 25,282 in Fall 2013 to 23,616 in Fall 2017. Unduplicated headcount for Mesa College was 2,746 in Intersession 2017, increasing to 2,960 in Intersession 2017 (the second time offered in the District since 2009). Unduplicated student headcount for Mesa College decreased 6%, from 24,706 in Spring 2013 to 23,224 in Spring 2018.



**Headcount by Gender:** On average, the female student headcount (52%) was higher than the male student headcount (48%). Both the female and male student headcounts decreased (3% & 10%, respectively) between Fall 2013 and Fall 2017.




Figure 1.2. Mesa College Headcount by Gender

**Headcount by Ethnicity:** Latinx students were the only ethnic group to experience a demonstrable increase in population at Mesa College between Fall 2013 and Fall 2017 (8%). Over that time period, Latinx students increased from 32% to 37% of the student population, surpassing White students as the most represented ethnic group on campus as of Fall 2014. Every other ethnic group besides students self-identifying as "other" experienced declining numbers, with Unreported, American Indian, and Asian/Pacific Islanders experiencing the largest declines (41%, 34%, & 23%, respectively).




Figure 1.3. Mesa College Headcount by Ethnicity

**Headcount by Age:** Students between ages 18 and 24, on average, constituted over half of the Mesa College student population (58%). The only age group to experience numerical gains were students under the age of 18, who increased their headcount from 1,176 in Fall 2013 to 1,482 in Fall 2017 (26% increase).




Figure 1.4. Mesa College Headcount by Age

**Headcount by Enrollment Status:** On average, 67% of the Mesa College student population were continuing students. A combined 20% were first-time students (10%) and first-time transfer students (10%). The number of continuing students and unreported students has remained relatively stable over the past five fall terms. Current high school students have increased by 33% from Fall 2013 to Fall 2017, while all other reported groups have experienced declines.




Figure 1.5. Mesa College Headcount by Enrollment Status

**Headcount by Educational Objective:** Just over half of the Mesa College student population (54%) selected transfer to obtain a BA/BS, with or without completing an AA/AS, as their educational objective during the five terms being reported. Expressed interest in earning a BA/BS has remained relatively stable over time, though students have increased their interest in earning an AA/AS on the way to their end goal (from 39% in Fall 2013 to 43% in Fall 2017). Expressed interest in other objectives has decreased, except for earning a high school degree/GED. Interest in transitioning from non-credit to credit increased until Fall 2015 before declining closer to Fall 2013 levels.




Figure 1.6. Mesa College Headcount by Educational Objective

**Headcount by Primary Language:** On average, the majority of the Mesa College student population (92%) reported English as their primary language, which was equal to all colleges in the District (92%). Students who reported primarily speaking a language other than English decreased by 29%, while also falling as an overall proportion of the student body (from 8% in Fall 2013 to 6% in Fall 2017).




Figure 1.7. Mesa College Headcount by Primary Language

**Headcount by Prior Education Level:** From Fall 2013 to Fall 2017, 71% of the Mesa College student population had a high school diploma, on average. The second largest group was students who had their bachelor's degree or higher (8%). Every group, except for Special Admit/K-12 (which increased 36% between Fall 2013 and Fall 2017), experienced declines since Fall 2013.




Figure 1.8. Mesa College Headcount by Prior Education Level

**Headcount by Service Area of Residence:** Between Fall 2013 and Fall 2017, Mesa College drew the largest portion of its student population from outside the SDCCD service area (34%), followed by the Mesa College service area (29%), and the City College/ECC service area (28%). While the number of students Mesa College is attracting has declined across service areas, the biggest decline happened among students attending from the Miramar College service area (20%).




Figure 1.9. Mesa College Headcount by Service Area of Residence

**Headcount by First Generation:** Between Fall 2013 and Fall 2017, on average, 27% of Mesa College students reported being first generation college students. The number of first generation students attending Mesa College has declined by 4% since Fall 2013. Students who were not first generation, on the other hand, decreased by 8% since Fall 2013.




Figure 1.10. Mesa College Headcount by First Generation

**Headcount by Residency Status:** Between Fall 2013 and Fall 2017, on average, 95% of the Mesa College students were California residents and just 5% were non-residents. The number of non-residents attending Mesa College has declined more than the number of California residents attending Mesa College since Fall 2013 (39% vs. 4%), though the small overall size of this population minimizes the impact of this decline.




Figure 1.11. Mesa College Headcount by Residency Status

**Headcount by Disability Support Programs and Services (DSPS):** On average, 4% of the Mesa College student population received disability support services between Fall 2013 and Fall 2017. This was equal to the percentage of students served by DSPS for all colleges in the District (4%). The number of students receiving disability support programs and services varied from a low of 911 in Fall 2013 to a high of 995 in Fall 2016, with this population maintaining relatively stable numerical and proportional representation.




Figure 1.12. Mesa College Headcount by Disability Support Programs and Services (DSPS)




Figure 1.13. Mesa College Headcount by Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS)

**Headcount by Day, Evening, & Online Status:** On average, nearly half of the Mesa College student population (47%) took day courses exclusively. The categories that experienced the most growth since Fall 2013 were Online Only students (43%) and On-campus/Online students (35%). Students taking evening courses exclusively and a combination of day and evening courses declined the most since Fall 2017 (43% & 30%, respectively).




Figure 1.14. Mesa College Headcount by Day, Evening, & Online Status




Figure 1.15. Mesa College Headcount by Military Status

On average, the greatest proportion of students who earned attempted units were those students in the 3.0-5.9 unit range (74%). The smallest proportion of students who earned the attempted units were those students in the 9.0-11.9 unit range (55%). There are no clear patterns in changes in passage rates over time.




Figure 1.16. Mesa College Headcount by Units Attempted by Units Earned

#### Section II Persistence Rates

This section of the Fact Book contains information on the term and annual persistence rates for first-time to college students. For purposes of this report, the term persistence rate is the percentage of first-time to college students who enrolled in a fall term as of official census who received a grade notation of A, B, C, D, F, P, NP, I, or RD and who enrolled in at least one course in the subsequent spring term and received a grade notation of A, B, C, D, F, P, NP, I, or RD (SDSU and UCSD-only students and sections are excluded. Intersession, tutoring, in-service, and cancelled classes are excluded). Annual persistence follows the same operational definition; however, student enrollments are tracked from fall to spring to fall.

The information in this section includes five years of data and is reported as follows:

- 1) Overall
- 2) Gender
- 3) Ethnicity
- 4) Age

Overall Persistence: The average term persistence rate of first-time students at Mesa College was 73% among the Fall 2012 to Fall 2017 cohorts, and the average annual persistence rate among the Fall 2012 to Fall 2016 cohorts was 52%. Overall, term persistence rates decreased by two percentage points, from 74% in Fall 2012 to 72% in Fall 2017. Annual persistence rates remained stable at 53% from Fall 2012 to Fall 2015. The average term and annual persistence rates of first-time Mesa College students were lower compared to the average term and annual persistence rate of first-time students enrolled in all colleges in the District (78% & 59%, respectively).




Figure 2.1. Mesa College First-Time Student Overall Annual Persistence

**Annual Persistence by Gender:** On average, annual persistence rates of female students (54%) were higher than their male student counterparts (50%) between the Fall 2012 and Fall 2016 cohorts. Persistence rates for female students increased by two percentage points whereas persistence rates for male students decreased by two percentage points between the Fall 2012 and Fall 2016 cohorts.




Figure 2.2. Mesa College First-Time Student Annual Persistence by Gender

**Annual Persistence by Ethnicity:** The ethnic groups with the highest annual persistence rates, on average, were Asian/Pacific Islander students (63%), Filipino students (52%), and Latinx students (52%). Asian/Pacific Islander students saw the greatest increase in persistence rates over this five year period, increasing six percentage points.




Figure 2.3. Mesa College First-Time Student Annual Persistence by Ethnicity




Figure 2.4. Mesa College First-Time Student Annual Persistence by Age

# Section III Student Completion

This section of the Fact Book contains information on various student completion outcomes which may be considered indirect assessments of student learning. The outcomes included in this section are: 1) Annual Successful Course Completion Rates, 2) Annual Retention Rates, 3) Annual GPA, 4) Annual Awards Conferred, and 5) Annual Transfer Volume. All of the information in this section includes five years of data by gender, age, and ethnicity. The following describes in detail each of the outcomes listed.

- 1) Successful Course Completion Rates. The first outcome reported in this section is successful course completion, or student success rate. For purposes of this report, the success rate is the percentage of students who complete a course with a grade of A, B, C, or P out of total official census enrollments. Tutoring, non-credit, and cancelled classes are excluded.
- 2) Retention Rates. The second outcome reported in this section is retention rate. For purposes of this report, the retention rate is the percentage of students who complete a course with a grade of A, B, C, D, F, P, NP, I or RD out of total official census enrollments. Tutoring and cancelled classes are excluded.
- 3) Annual GPA. The third outcome reported in this section is annual GPA. For purposes of this report, the annual GPA is the total grade point average of all students for a given academic year.
- 4) Annual Awards Conferred. The fourth outcome reported in this section is the annual awards conferred. For purposes of this report, the annual awards conferred are the total number of associate degrees and certificates awarded in a single academic year (summer, fall, and spring). Note. Annual awards conferred that are reported in this Fact Book are up to date for all Chancellor Approved Categories. Non-Chancellor approved Award counts can be found in the upcoming Awards Conferred Supplement Report.
- 5) Annual Transfer Volume. The last outcome reported in this section is the number of students who transferred annually. For the purposes of this report, the annual transfer volume represents the total number of students who transferred to a 4-year institution and were enrolled at an SDCCD college at any time within six semesters prior to transferring (including stop outs). The student must also have completed 12 or more transferrable units from any one of the SDCCD credit colleges within six years prior to transferring to a 4-year institution. Note. Transfer volume parameters were changed for this report beginning with the 2014 Fact Book. Final data is now reported for 2012/13 2016/17. Additionally, due to entry requirements at the CSU/UCs that delay transferring, the number of semesters prior to transferring was increased from three to six. Thus, totals will be different when comparing historical terms to previous editions of the Fact Book. Please see the 2018 SDCCD Transfer Report: A Comprehensive Perspective for comparable transfer volume numbers, which will be available in May 2019.

**Overall Success Rates:** Mesa College annual success rates increased two percentage points from 2013/14 to 2017/18, with a five-year average of 71%. Over the last five years, the average success rate at Mesa College was equal to the average success rate of all colleges in the District (71%).

Figure 3.1. Mesa College Overall Success Rates






Figure 3.2. Mesa College Success Rates by Gender

Success Rates by Ethnicity: On average, the ethnic groups with the highest success rates between 2013/14 and 2017/18 were Asian/Pacific Islander students (78%) and White students (76%). The average success rates of Latinx students (66%) and African American students (61%) were lower than the average success rates of the general student populations at Mesa College and all colleges in the District (71% each). All ethnic groups showed increases in success rates between 2013/14 and 2017/18.




Figure 3.3. Mesa College Success Rates by Ethnicity




Figure 3.4. Mesa College Success Rates by Age

Figure 3.5. Mesa College Overall Retention Rates






Figure 3.6. Mesa College Retention Rates by Gender




Figure 3.7. Mesa College Retention Rates by Ethnicity




Figure 3.8. Mesa College Retention Rates by Age

Figure 3.9. Mesa College Overall Annual GPA






Figure 3.10. Mesa College Annual GPA by Gender




Figure 3.11. Mesa College Annual GPA by Ethnicity




Figure 3.12. Mesa College Annual GPA by Age

Annual Awards Conferred: In 2017/18, Mesa College awarded 10 bachelor's degrees after successfully piloting a baccalaureate program in Health Information Management. Two more BS degrees were earned in the Summer 2018 semester. On average in the last five academic years, 81% of the awards conferred at Mesa College were associate degrees, 13% were certificates requiring 30 to 59 units, and 6% were certificates requiring 29 or fewer units. 


Figure 3.13. Mesa College Overall Annual Awards Conferred





Figure 3.14.2. Mesa College Annual Certificates 30 to 59 Units by Gender Figure 3.14.3. Mesa College Annual Certificates 29 or Fewer Units by Gender










Annual Awards Conferred by Ethnicity: The greatest share of BS degrees awarded in 2017/18 were earned by Asian/Pacific Islander students (33%), followed by White students (25%), and Latinx students (25%). On average, the greatest share of associate degrees were earned by White students (37%), Latinx students (32%), and Asian/Pacific Islander students (13%). It is additionally notable that since 2013/14, the number of associate degrees awarded to Latinx students has steadily increased, and the number of associate degrees awarded to African American students has also increased each year since 2015/16. The proportion of certificates awarded by ethnic group largely followed the same trend as associate degrees, except for certificates requiring 60 or more units, 50% of which were earned by Latinx students.










Figure 3.15.3. Mesa College Annual Certificates 29 or Fewer Units by Ethnicity

Annual Awards Conferred by Age: In 2017/18, over half of the BS degrees awarded by Mesa College were earned by students between 40 and 49 years and students aged 50 and greater. On average, nearly half of associate degrees conferred were earned by students between 18 and 24 years old (49%), while students aged 25-29 earned 26% of the share, and 30-39 year old students received 17% of associate degrees conferred. Students aged 18-24 years old also received the greatest proportion of certificates requiring 30 to 59 units (34%), followed by students aged 25-29 (29%), and students between 30 and 39 years of age (23%). For certificates requiring 29 units or fewer, however, students between 30 and 39 years received 28% of the share, followed by students between 25 and 29 years of age (24%), and students aged 18-24 years (20%).





Figure 3.16.2. Mesa College Annual Certificates 30 to 59 Units by Age






Figure 3.16.3. Mesa College Annual Certificates 29 or Fewer Units by Age

Figure 3.17. Mesa College Overall Annual Transfers






Figure 3.18. Mesa College Annual Transfers by Gender




Figure 3.19. Mesa College Annual Transfers by Ethnicity




Figure 3.20. Mesa College Annual Transfers by Age

Annual Transfer Volume by CSU/UC/Private (In-State)/Out-of-State: On average, between 2012/13 and 2016/17, nearly half of the Mesa College transfer volume was comprised of students who transferred to the California State University system (CSU; 44%), followed by students who transferred to out-of-state institutions (22%), the University of California system (UC; 18%), and in-state private institutions (16%). Transfer volume increased 28% for students who transferred from Mesa College to the CSU system, 23% for students who transferred to the UC system, and 10% for students who transferred to out-of-state institutions. 


Figure 3.21. Mesa College Annual Transfers by CSU/UC/Private (In-State)/Out-of-State

Annual Transfer Volume by CSU/UC: Of the total Mesa College transfer volume between 2012/13 and 2016/17, 62% of students transferred to either the California State University (CSU) or University of California (UC) systems on average (44% & 18%, respectively; see Table 3.21). Of the total number of students who transferred to CSU or UC systems, the majority went to CSU (71%), and over one quarter went to UC (29%), on average. There was an increase in the number of students who transferred from Mesa College to both the CSU and UC systems (28% & 23%, respectively) between 2012/13 and 2016/17.




Figure 3.22. Mesa College Annual Transfers by CSU/UC




Figure 3.23. Mesa College Annual Transfers by Institution Type

# Section IV Productivity and Efficiency

This section of the Fact Book contains information on productivity and efficiency measures. The following describes in detail each of the measures:

- 1) FTES. The first measure reported in this section is a measure of productivity. FTES is the total number of full-time equivalent students enrolled. Includes non-residents. Excludes apprenticeship classes, students who enroll after census, apprenticeship students enrolled in a non-apprenticeship class, ineligible course repetitions, non-state supported classes, and cancelled classes. F-Factor is included when reported annually.
- 2) Enrollments. The second measure in this section of the report is also a measure of productivity. Enrollments are the number of seats enrolled, or duplicated headcount, based on official census. Drops, never attends, cancelled, and tutoring classes are excluded.
- 3) Fill Rates. The third measure reported in this section is a measure of efficiency. Fill rates are the enrollment divided by the course enrollment capacity as set in the curriculum outline. Apprenticeship, in-service, cancelled, tutoring classes, and classes with a capacity of 0 or 1 are excluded.
- 4) Load. The fourth measure reported in this section is a measure of efficiency. Load is the ratio of Weekly Student Contact Hours (WSCH) to Full-time Equivalent Faculty (FTEF). Tutoring, positive attendance, and cancelled sections are excluded.

**Annual Resident FTES:** Overall, from 2013/14 to 2017/18, Mesa College resident credit FTES decreased 3%, from 15,353 in 2013/14 to 14,869 in 2017/18. Mesa College did not claim any FTES for tutoring from 2013/14 to 2017/18; thus, resident noncredit FTES was reported as zero for these years.

Figure 4.1.1 Mesa College Annual Resident FTES






Figure 4.1.2 Mesa College Annual Nonresident FTES

**Enrollments:** Mesa College enrollment increased sharply from Summer 2013 to Summer 2014, and then continued to increase, yielding a 28% net increase from Summer 2014 to Summer 2017 (compared to a 37% increase for all colleges in the District). Overall Mesa College enrollment decreased 8% between Fall 2013 and Fall 2017, and decreased 9% between Spring 2014 and Spring 2018, while enrollment for all colleges in the District remained the same (0%) and decreased 2%, respectively, during the same periods.

Figure 4.2.1 Mesa College Enrollments (Summer)




Figure 4.2.3 Mesa College Enrollments (Intersession)




Figure 4.2.2 Mesa College Enrollments (Fall)





Figure 4.2.4. Mesa College Enrollments (Spring)



Fill Rates: Between 2013/14 and 2017/18, the overall average Mesa College fill rates were higher in fall and spring (85% & 80%, respectively) than in summer (72%). Between 2013/14 and 2017/18, fill rates decreased for fall (89% to 80%, respectively), and spring (86% to 76%, respectively) terms. On average, fill rates were higher for the on campus mode of instruction in the fall and spring terms (86% & 81%, respectively) when compared to the online mode of instruction (80% & 79%, respectively), while fill rates for summer on campus (70%) were slightly lower than the online (74%) mode of instruction. On average, Mesa College summer, fall, and spring fill rates (72%, 85%, & 80%, respectively) were comparable to the fill rates for all colleges in the District (74%, 85%, & 81%, respectively).

Figure 4.3.1. Mesa College Fill Rates (Summer)




Figure 4.3.3 Mesa College Fill Rates (Intersession)




Figure 4.3.2. Mesa College Fill Rates (Fall)




Figure 4.3.4. Mesa College Fill Rates (Spring)



**Load:** The fall load values at Mesa College decreased, from 555 in Fall 2013 to 480 in Fall 2017, and spring displayed a similar trend, declining from 521 in Spring 2014 to 453 in Spring 2018. In general, while Mesa College load values varied term to term, they were generally lower when compared to the load values for all the colleges in the District. The statewide benchmark for load is 525 for a 17.5 week semester. SDCCD has set an internal benchmark of 557, which is commensurate to its 16.5 week semester.

#### Section V Human Resources

This section of the Fact Book contains information on the number and classification of employees during the Spring 2018 semester, as of March 31, 2018. The information is reported as follows:

- 1) Employment Type
- 2) Ethnicity
- 3) Gender

**Spring 2018 Employee Breakdown:** There were a total of 2,639 employees working at Mesa College in Spring 2018. Adjunct faculty comprised the largest percentage of Mesa College employees (63%), followed by non-academic hourly (20%), contract faculty (9%), and classified staff (6%). Supervisory staff and management constituted the smallest proportions of Mesa College employees (1% each).

The ethnic breakdown showed that White employees constituted half (50%) of the total employee population, followed by Latinx employees (16%), Asian employees (12%), and African American employees (6%). White employees constituted less than half of the classified staff (33%) and made up over half of the faculty positions (52% of contract & 57% of adjunct faculty) at Mesa College. White employees constituted more than half (58%) of management positions, while Latinx and African American employees held a combined 27% of the management positions (16% & 11%, respectively). Among supervisory staff positions, White employees comprised the largest percentage of employees (32%) followed by Latinx employees (20%). African American and Asian employees held a combined 32% of the group (16% each).

Figure 5.1. Mesa College Spring 2018 Employees by Employment Type




Figure 5.2. Mesa College Spring 2018 Employees by Ethnicity


