Among the largest of California’s 73 community college districts, the San Diego Community College District (SDCCD) serves approximately 102,000 students annually at its three credit colleges, San Diego City College, Mesa College, Miramar College, and the seven non-credit campuses of San Diego Continuing Education. The colleges offer associate degrees, and Continuing Education and the credit colleges offer career technical certificates that prepare students for transfer to universities and/or career pathways for gainful employment. In addition, Mesa College offers a bachelor’s degree in Health Information Management as part of California’s Baccalaureate Degree Pilot Program. The SDCCD maintains active partnerships with local industry, the community, military, and educational institutions to ensure students have clear pathways to careers and the next stage of their education. The District’s credit colleges and Continuing Education each provide vibrant campuses, offering accessible, diverse learning experiences in a multicultural setting that both reflects and meets the needs of the community. With a focus on innovation, access, and excellence, the SDCCD is redefining the community college experience. The District and its graduates had a combined economic benefit to the region of \$4.4 billion last fiscal year. The District also proudly serves over 10,000 active-duty military personnel, veterans, and dependents. The SDCCD is governed by its five-member, locally elected Board of Trustees and three student members serving on a rotating basis. The District follows a participatory governance structure that provides opportunities for constituent groups to participate in all planning processes. SDCCD trustees are elected in even-numbered years to four-year terms by the voters of San Diego. The Chancellor, the District’s chief executive officer, is responsible for carrying out the policies approved by the Board of Trustees.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

The San Diego Community College District’s \$1.555 billion Propositions S and N construction bond program has provided for new, state-of-the-art instructional and career training facilities, major renovations, public safety and accessibility enhancements, parking, and infrastructure projects at City, Mesa and Miramar Colleges, and seven Continuing Education campuses. All construction is completed in accordance with the District’s Green Building Policy and Major Renovation Standards. The policy calls for four key performance goals, and includes formal pursuit of Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certification. The District is on track to obtain a total of 42 LEED certified buildings. The final classroom building project to be constructed under Propositions S and N – the City College Child Development Center – is underway and scheduled to be completed in late Spring 2020.

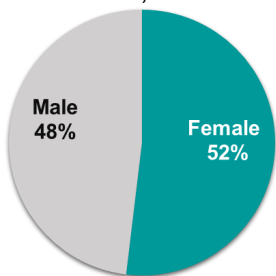

San Diego City College Overview

Established in 1914 as the first community college in San Diego and the fifth in California, San Diego City College has served our communities for more than 105 years. As the District's flagship college, the multicultural campus is home to nearly 16,000 students each fall and spring semester, and more than 200 degrees and programs, and more than 1,500 classes. Located in vibrant East Village, the 60-acre urban campus serves as the educational

cornerstone of downtown San Diego. City College is a short walk from the City College Trolley Station, world-renown Balboa Park, the Gaslamp Quarter, Petco Park, and the San Diego Bay. Through 2020, the college is completing the final phases of the largest transformation in its history, including the addition of five classroom buildings. In 2019, City College faculty and staff hosted its fifth annual Social Justice and Education Conference to continue to advance the role of social justice in academics. City College also offers career technical training for in-demand fields such as cybersecurity, environmental control technology, biotechnology, computer information systems, digital music technology, and machine technology. City College alumni are employed throughout the region as technology specialists, business leaders, radio/TV broadcasters, linguists, cosmetologists, fitness specialists, and child development teachers. Nursing graduates work in every major health care facility in the region. Additionally, the visual and performing arts department offers theater, dance, music, fine art, and award-winning graphic design and photography programs. The Fine Art Gallery and Luxe Photography Gallery highlight both campus and community works. Offering exceptional student support services and excellence in education, City College remains a number one choice for a quality education.

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

Propositions S & N-funded projects for the 60-acre City College have included six new instructional and career training facilities, eight major renovations, and new parking, public safety, and infrastructure projects.

Construction for a new Child Development Center is underway with an estimated completion date of Summer 2020. The building consists of new spaces for child care from infant, toddler and pre-K with unique play areas for the different age groups, along with observation rooms for students in the child development program. Recently, a major renovation was completed for the A and T buildings on campus, providing a complete interior transformation of both buildings, new technology, new finishes, extensive new hardscape to create, for the first time in the campus' history, pathways and gathering areas in between the two previously unconnected buildings. City College has also modernized its cafeteria with a new kitchen and upgraded its veterans' center to provide greater services for those who have served us.

After all the major construction is completed, there will be some on-going minor renovation projects throughout the campus to return temporary spaces back to their original condition along with repairing the smart meters to be able to track energy data on individual buildings. Additionally, a small project is planned for the final removal of all temporary classroom (bungalow) buildings from the campus.

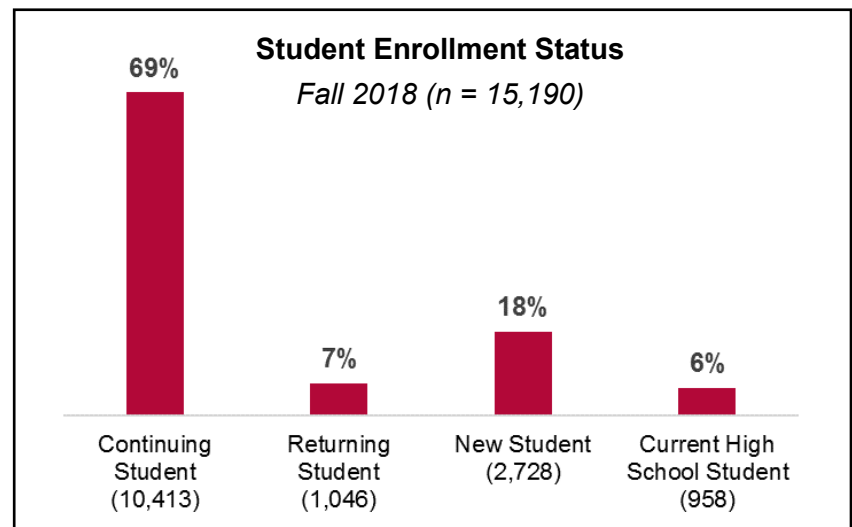

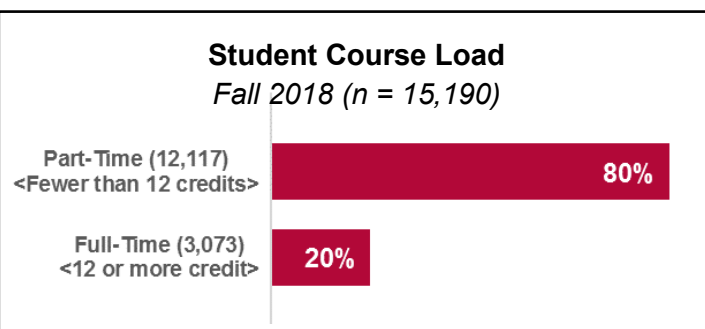

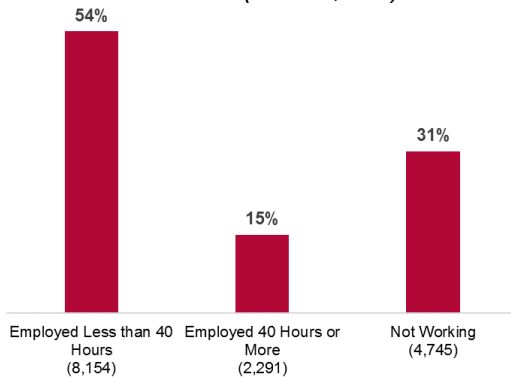

Enrollments by Mode of Instruction Fall 2018 (n = 33,789)



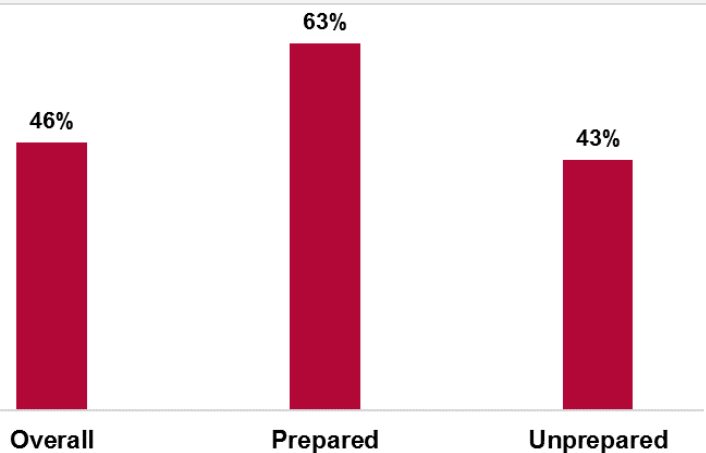

Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

Situated on over 100 acres, Mesa College is one of the largest community colleges in California. Propositions S & N-funded projects for Mesa have included six new academic and career training facilities, two campus support facilities, five major renovation projects, and numerous infrastructure, parking, and public safety projects.

Recently, the campus’ new Center for Business Technology (BT) building opened, expanding upon the east campus gateway projects. The dramatically-renovated Fine Arts (FA) building opened on the northern perimeter, and provides a modern and spacious museum-quality gallery on the main campus entry level.

There are a few smaller projects scheduled for 2019-2020. The installation of new cell phone antennas are being designed and planned for installation during this fiscal year. A new single megawatt fuel cell is currently in design with an estimated installation for Spring 2020 which will convert natural gas into electricity and supply the campus with its average base load. The quad project is finishing up design to remove most of the single story buildings (I-100, I-200, J-100) and create an outdoor space with amphitheater, new pathways between new buildings, and grass and landscape areas with an anticipated construction start in Summer 2020. Other projects include increasing the number of ADA-accessible spaces under the solar carports located throughout the campus, rebalancing and recommissioning the central plant for optimum efficiency, and repairing smart meters to be able to track energy data on individual buildings.

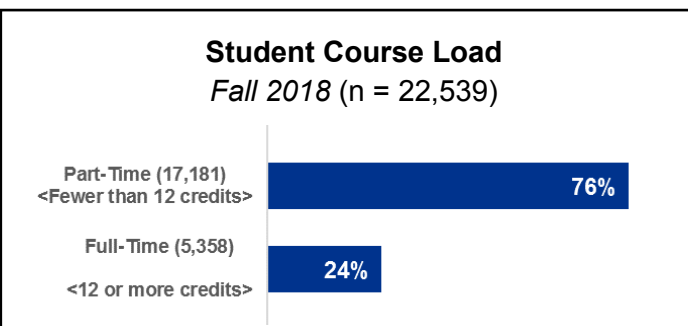

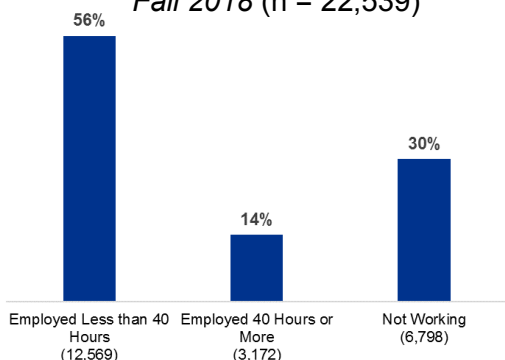

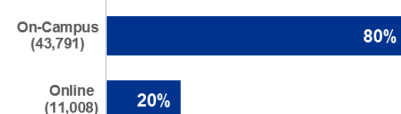
Sections Offered by Mode of Instruction

Fall 2018 (n = 54,799)



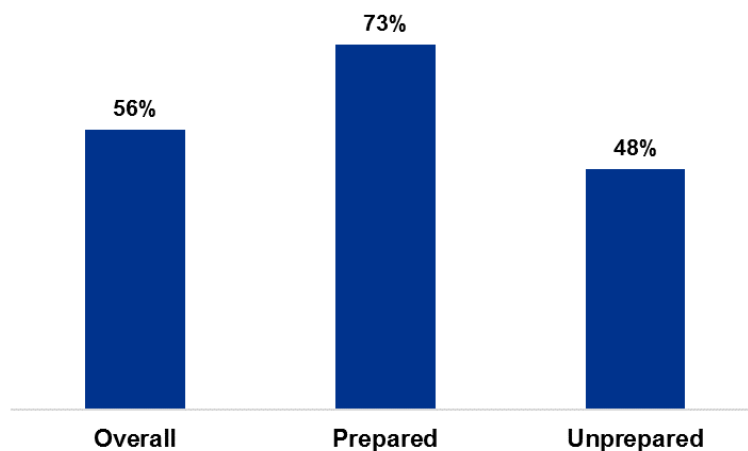

Miramar College, a comprehensive community college committed to student success, is located in the Mira Mesa/Scripps Ranch area of San Diego along the I-15 corridor, offers 70 academic majors, 90 career technical education certificates, and a full range of transfer programs to students looking to attend UC, CSU and private universities. The College serves approximately 28,000 students annually. To enrich student life, Miramar College fields five intercollegiate sports teams. Partnerships with local

industry and the City and County of San Diego help Miramar College prepare students for high demand and well-paying careers in the highly competitive labor market, including biotechnology, paralegal, aviation, automotive, diesel, and alternative fuels technologies. Miramar College is home to the Southern California Biotechnology Center, Advanced Transportation and Technology Center, and San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute. Since 1969, the college has provided training for nearly all law enforcement officers and firefighters within San Diego County. The Public Safety Institute also trains EMTs and offers the only open water lifeguard degree program in the world. The College is proud of its state-of-the-art facilities, including those for departments such as science; automotive; heavy duty advanced transportation; fitness/athletics/health; humanities/arts and business/math classroom facilities; fire science/EMT training; MTS transit; and a 100,000 square foot library/learning resources center and student union to meet the comprehensive instructional and student service needs of its growing student body. This Spring, Miramar College awarded more than 1,000 associate degrees – an increase of over 20 percent from last year – and nearly 700 certificates.

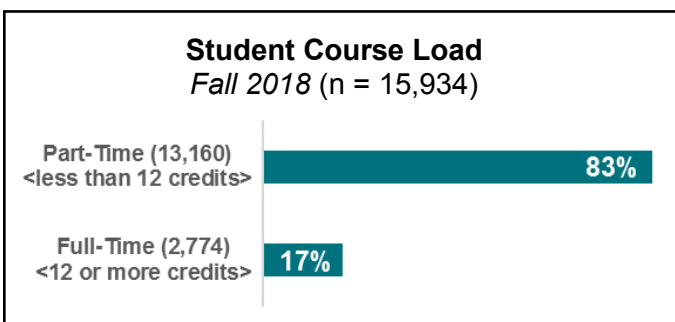

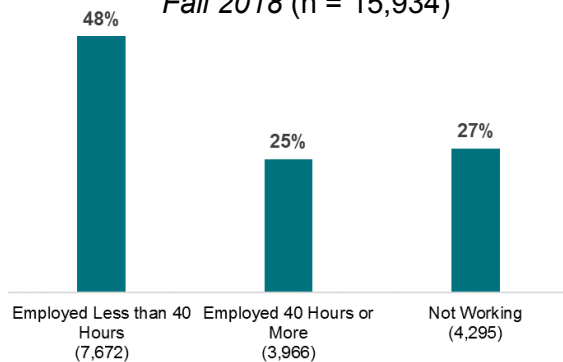

Enrollments by Course Type* Fall 2018

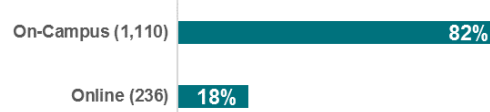

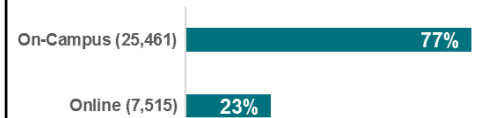

Enrollments by Mode of Instruction Fall 2018 (n = 32,976)



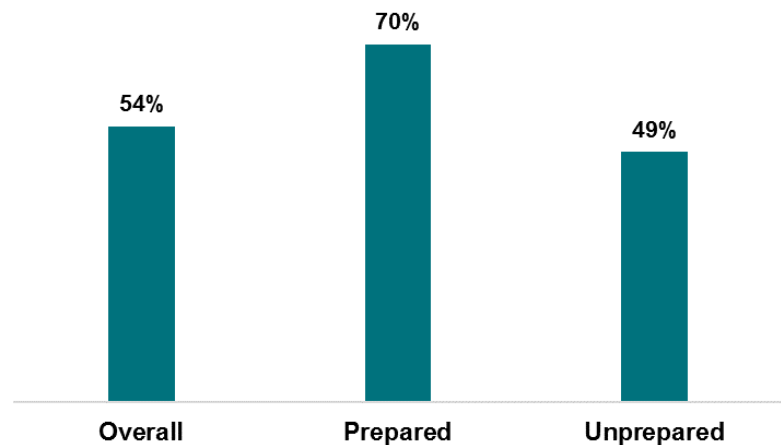

San Diego Continuing Education (SDCE) is the adult education division of SDCCD. Approximately 40,000 students are served each academic year at seven campuses and hundreds of community locations. SDCE is one of the oldest and largest noncredit institutions in the nation, serving San Diegans since 1914. Students are among the most diverse in California—culturally, ethnically and educationally. Noncredit classes are offered at no cost, and students who enroll in classes have a variety of educational and personal goals. Programs address essential areas of adult education including short-term career training in priority industry sectors (e.g. Information and Communication Technologies, Clean Energy, Health Care and Advanced Manufacturing), career development, English as a Second Language, adult basic skills, an Emeritus program for age 55+, parenting, and Disability Support Programs and Services. Additionally, a Community Education program offers low fee classes for professional and personal enrichment, and employers benefit from customized workforce training through our Employee Training Institute. SDCE was one of the first noncredit institutions in the U.S. to be separately accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). The administrators, faculty, and staff are highly qualified with many holding master's degrees and several holding doctoral degrees.

San Diego Continuing Education is made up of seven unique campuses located throughout the City. Propositions S & N-funded projects for Continuing Education included the construction of six new campus facilities - Mid-City Campus, North City Campus, West City Campus, Continuing Education Mesa College Campus, Continuing Education Miramar College Campus, César E. Chávez Campus, and the new Skills Center at the Educational Cultural Complex (ECC). An 18,000 square foot wing was added to the ECC as well, creating a permanent home for programs previously housed in bungalows and modular classrooms. The bond program also provided for a complete seismic retrofit for the Centre City Campus. No major construction projects are currently planned for the 2019-2020 school year.

Definition of Terms

San Diego Community College District

ACP/CCAP

ACP or Accelerated College Program is a concurrent enrollment program developed to create a seamless pathway to community college for high school students that are traditionally underserved in higher education. ACP is a part of the CCAP program.

Annual Year (2018-2019)

For reporting purposes, the 2018-2019 Annual Year refers to Summer 2018, Fall 2018, Intersession 2019, and Spring 2019.

Basic Skills Courses

Courses in English and math that are one level or more below transfer level English and math. Also included are all ESOL courses.

CCAP

CCAP or College and Career Access Pathways is a concurrent enrollment program developed to create pathways to community college for Career Technical Education (CTE) or preparation for transfer.

Contact Hours

Number of student contact hours for all methods of accounting including: WSCH, DSCH, PA, PO, PQ, IS, and IX.

Degrees, Certificates, and Diplomas

The number of degrees, certificates, and diplomas awarded in Summer 2018, Fall 2018, and Spring 2019.

Enrollment - College

The number of seats enrolled, or duplicated headcount. Drops, never attends, cancelled, and tutoring classes are excluded.

Enrollment - Continuing Education

The number of seats enrolled, or duplicated headcount. Less than one attendance hour, drops, never attends, and cancelled classes are excluded.

First Generation Students

Students who have identified themselves as the first generation in their family to attend college.

FTES

The total number of full-time equivalent students enrolled. Excludes non-state supported, cancelled, and tutoring classes. F-Factor is included.

Headcount

The individual count of students, or unduplicated headcount. Drops, never attends, and cancelled classes are excluded. Apprenticeship, contract, and fee-only students are also excluded.

Retention Rate

The percentage of students who complete a course with a grade of A, B, C, D, F, P, NP, I or RD out of total official census enrollments. Tutoring and cancelled classes are excluded.

San Diego Promise

These numbers reflect unduplicated headcount for Fall 2018 Promise Participants. The Campus listed is the "home" campus where students received Promise services. This count includes 2018-2019 Promise participants that signed a commitment contract and participants from the 2017-2018 cohort that returned for a second year and signed a re-commitment contract.

Students Receiving Financial Aid

The number of students who were enrolled as of official census and received financial aid.

Success Rate

The percentage of students who complete a course with a grade of A, B, C, or P out of total official census enrollments. Tutoring, noncredit, and cancelled classes are excluded.

Transfers

The total number of students who transferred to a 4-year institution and were enrolled at an SDCCD college at any time within six semesters prior to transferring (including stop outs). The student must also have completed 12 or more transferrable units from any one of the SDCCD credit colleges within six years prior to transferring to a 4-year institution.
