Background


- AB 288 (Holden) authorized the College and Career Access Pathways (CCAP) Program
- Allowed community colleges to enter into partnership agreements with their public school district to offer college classes on the high school campuses
- Purpose of the CCAP Program is to serve students who may not already be college-bound or underrepresented in higher education to provide seamless pathways from high school to community college
- AB 288 authorized the following:
 - Classes on the high school campus can be closed to the public
 - All fees are waived regardless of the number of units
 - The school district must pay costs for all instructional materials
 - Classes cannot displace high school or college teachers/faculty







- Piloting a partially online high-level math class across three high schools: Patrick Henry High School, Point Loma High School, and Morse High School



Charter Schools

Background

- The 2018-2019 Budget Trailer Bill authorized community colleges to enter into CCAP agreements with public Charter Schools to offer classes on the campus of a Charter School
- Purpose of the CCAP Program is to serve students who may not already be college-bound or underrepresented in higher education, creating seamless pathways from high school to community college
- Agreements with Charter Schools must meet the same requirements specified in AB 288, College and Career Access Pathways Partnership
 - Classes on the high school campus can be closed to the public
 - All fees are waived regardless of the number of units
 - The school district must pay costs for all instructional materials
 - Classes cannot displace high school teachers/faculty
