- 1.0 Approval of Minutes
 - March 15, 2007
 - Approved
- 2.0 Early Decision Program (Matric Deans) @ 9:15 a.m.
 - Mandatory Orientation for Students
 - It was shared with the Council that there have been a number of discussions at the Trustee Advisory Council (TAC), Enrollment Management Committee and the Basic Skills Committee regarding a more prescriptive first year experience for incoming freshmen to improve student retention and student success.
 - Joi Blake, Matriculation Dean at Mesa College, brought forward a proposal from Mesa to pilot the program for Spring 2007. The Matriculation Deans were invited to the meeting to discuss further.

- The pilot would include the components of matriculation, including mandatory orientation, assessment, placement in English and math and a learning community structure.
- After much discussion, the Council proposed a pilot cohort of 500 first-time freshmen for Fall 2007. Each college will identify certain high schools that will be targeted for the pilot.
- The Council discussed a possible pilot for Continuing Education students who are transitioning to the college program. It was agreed to look at the interests of the CE students attending the special program at Mesa, in April, and discuss a possible structure for the future.
- The Council discussed and proposed the following pilot program components:
 - Step 1: Complete Application for Admission
 - Workshops will be conducted at the high schools
 - Step 2: Complete assessment in English and math (2 weeks after application is completed)
 - Step 3: Complete mandatory orientation (to be conducted on the high school campus)
 - Complete enrollment worksheets with "prescribed" tentative schedule
 All students will be enrolled in:
 - English
 - Math
 - Personal Growth 127 (to be renamed)
 - 1 GE course
 - Set up a 2nd visit with student to confirm education plan and schedule
 - Advise students/parents that acceptance package will arrive in mail
 - FA workshop, EOPS, "Cash in on College"
 - Step 4: Mail Acceptance Package (June 1st) Notice on outside to read "acceptance information enclosed."
 - Notification of registration payment due date
 - Financial aid information and workshop schedule

Step 5: Students will be registered July 16

Confirmation of classes and statement of payment mailed

Step 6: Provide additional support services (tutoring) and second semester planning

Step 7: Student progress will be tracked the first year

- The next step is to submit the proposal to Chancellor's Cabinet for approval of the concept.
- 3.0 Revision to Procedure 3900.4
 - Credit Available for Standardized Testing Programs
 - The Council was provided with a draft update of *Procedure 3900.4, Credit Available for Standardized Testing Programs* submitted by the Evaluations Subcommittee for review. The changes were language update only. The Council reviewed and approved the changes.
- 4.0 National University Scholarship Revisited
 - The Council was reminded that National University provides a \$1,600 scholarship
 to the colleges each year for a student transferring to National. Back in 2005,
 when the program was implemented the colleges agreed to incorporate the award
 into their regular scholarship awards program for future years.
 - The Vice Presidents were asked to check and make sure that the scholarship is part of their scholarship programs.
- 5.0 Alliant International University Agreement Revisited
 - MOU Status
 - The Council discussed the status of the MOU agreement. Peter White shared that the draft is going to President's Cabinet next week. He will bring back their recommendation to the next SSC meeting.
 - Gerald Ramsey stated that the draft MOU is ready to go to President's Cabinet.
 He will also bring forward City's recommendation.

- 6.0 Student Representation Fee Guidelines Revisited
 - Status
 - At the last meeting the Council discussed the status of the Student Representation Fee Guidelines and agreed that the draft should be reviewed by the AS organizations on campus.
 - Peter White shared that Miramar's Associated Students have reviewed and approved. Damon Bell shared that Mesa has approved as well.
 - Gerald Ramsey shared that he is not sure about City's Associated Students as he is waiting on Mario Chacon. Gerald will confirm.
- 7.0 Joint SSC/CIC Meeting Reconfirming
 - The Council discussed a joint CIC meeting on May 10th from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.
 - As May 10th is a Board meeting, the Council felt that this was not the best date for the joint meeting. A fall meeting would be preferred.
 - The Council agreed to add the freshmen first year experience pilot to the joint meeting agenda.
