

College Promise Program 2016-2017 Pilot

California has emerged as a leader in the development and implementation of College Promise programs with 23 programs in place as of August 2016. This figure has increased to 27 as of August 2017 according to CollegePromise.org.

- In Fall 2016, the District launched the San Diego Promise pilot. The purpose of the program is to ensure that no deserving student is denied the opportunity to go to college due to lack of resources.
- Program participants receive:
 - Their enrollment fees paid
 - Up to \$1,000 in grants for textbooks and supplies
 - Wrap-around support, including regular meetings with a counselor, participation in workshops, and frequent email reminders to assist in remaining on track.



Participant Eligibility

- Graduating senior from San Diego Unified School District or eligible student from San Diego Continuing Education
- Minimum 2.0 GPA
- Resident of CA for tuition purposes (or AB540 eligible)


Program Requirements

- Enrolled in at least 12 units each semester
- Complete eight hours of community service (annual)
- Maintain a minimum GPA of 2.0
- Participate in a transition program (e.g. FYE)


Selection

- 314 students applied and 188 were selected
- Selections were made based on need, including barriers and challenges faced in high school, and commitment to completing a college degree, certificate, or transfer program

Student Characteristics - Fall 2016




The proportion of female students in the Promise program (64%) was greater than the proportion of females amongst all other first-time full-time students (49%).



- First-Time, Full-Time Students






Over one-third of the Promise cohort (38%) were first generation college students, which is higher than the percentage of first generation college students amongst first-time full-time students (30%). The percentage of Promise students receiving financial aid was also higher (87%) compared to all other first-time full-time students (70%).

Student Characteristics - Fall 2016

The majority of students in the Promise program were SDUSD high school graduates (86%), while 14% were prior Continuing Education students. Approximately 4% of College Promise students received DSPS services and 20% received EOPS services.



Promise Survey

In Fall 2016, a survey was conducted to evaluate Promise students' satisfaction and perception of the program. All Promise students enrolled in the Fall 2016 term were invited to participate in the online survey. A total of 100 responses were collected, yielding a 54% response rate.



Which program of study or career are you pursuing?




Influence of San Diego Promise

The majority of students believe San Diego Promise has positively influenced their academic success

- 93% Agreed or strongly agreed that the program is helping them achieve their academic goals
- 92% Agreed or strongly agreed that the program is helping to reduce barriers in achieving academic goals
- 91% Agreed or strongly agreed that the program is having a positive impact on their life

On Track to Successfully Complete 12 Units

Just over half of the respondents (52%) strongly agreed and one-fifth (22%) agreed that they were on track to successfully complete 12 or more units. Seven percent disagreed or strongly disagreed and approximately one-fifth (18%) were neutral.




In Fall 2016, only 66% of Promise students actually completed 12 or more units, indicating students somewhat overestimated their ability to successfully complete the required number of units.

In Fall 2016, 98% of the College Promise cohort attempted 12 or more units and 66% earned 12 or more units. In Spring 2017, 91% attempted 12 or more units and 53% earned 12 or more units.

Student Outcomes - Success

Promise students had higher successful course completion rates in Fall 2016 and Spring 2017 (77% and 74%) compared to all other first-time full-time students (72% and 68%).

Student Outcomes - Retention

Promise students had higher retention rates in Fall 2016 and Spring 2017 (94% and 89%) compared to all other first-time full-time students (91% and 87%).

In Fall 2016, three-quarters of the Promise cohort (76%) earned a GPA of 2.0 or above, while approximately 3% of the cohort dropped or withdrew from all of their classes.

Student Outcomes - GPA Distribution

In Spring 2017, 68% of the Promise cohort earned a GPA of 2.0 or above, while approximately 10% of the cohort did not enroll in the term, dropped, or withdrew from all of their classes.

Program Requirements

In 2016/17, 101 out of 186 students (54%) met the annual GPA and unit requirements for the Promise program (minimum 2.0 GPA and 24 or more units earned).

The majority of students who responded to the survey had not dropped below 12 units, but those who had (n=11) cited the following reasons:

- 18% Work commitments
- 9% Difficulty with classes
- 5% Dissatisfaction with instructor

Persistence

Promise students had higher Fall to Spring persistence rates (93%) compared to all other first-time full-time students (91%).
