San Diego Promise Program Expansion Background

- The San Diego Promise Program Pilot began in 2016–2017 with 186 participants
- In 2017–2018 the program expanded to include approximately 650 students
- Participants included students from SDUSD, Continuing Education, and the Monarch School
- 80% of participants qualified for financial aid
- Initial research shows promising outcomes for San Diego Promise students
- AB 19 California College Promise will enable the District to leverage state funds to continue to expand the program in 2018-2019

AB 19 - California College Promise Overview

- Established by the State Legislature for the 2018-2019 academic year
- Provides funds to waive fees for all first-time, full-time students for one year
- Funding does not supplant the BOG Waiver
 - BOG Waiver was renamed to California College Promise Grant (CCPG)
- AB 19 will enable the District to expand the San Diego Promise to a two-year program
- Funds may also be used for other support such as instructional materials to advance the goals of the legislation

AB 19 - California College Promise Overview 2018-2019 Allocation

Allocation based upon three factors as a portion of the state total:

- 78% number of 2016–2017 California resident students who were first-time, full-time and did not receive California College Promise Grant (CCPG), formerly known as Board of Governor's Waiver (BOGW)
- ▶ 16% number of Pell Grant recipients
- 5% total FTES for each college (includes non-credit FTES)

AB 19 - California College Promise Overview

Funds must be used to advance the goals of the legislation:

- Increase number and percent of high school students who are prepared for and attend college directly from high school; and increase percent of high school graduates who are placed directly into transfer level English and math courses
- Increase percent of students who earn degrees and certificates; and increase percentage of students who report being employed in their field of study
- Increase percent of students who transfer to CSU or UC; and increase percent of students who graduate from college with a bachelor's degree
- Reduce and eliminate regional achievement gaps and achievement gaps for underrepresented students, low-income, foster youth, students with disabilities, formerly incarcerated, undocumented and AB 540 students, and veterans

San Diego Promise Program: 2018-2019

Year One - Funded by AB 19

- Program participants must sign a Program Commitment Contract
- All participants must complete a Personal Growth (college transition) class in their incoming Fall semester
- All students will participate in an orientation program
- Participants will be provided the full range of support services, including tutoring, academic program planning, follow up and peer mentoring
- Students with financial need will receive a small grant for instructional materials depending upon available resources

San Diego Promise Program

Year Two – Funded through Private Donations

- Funding will be provided by the District through private donations
- All program participants who successfully complete 24 units in year one will be eligible for year two
- Participants with financial need will receive a small grant for instructional materials depending upon available resources
- Participants will continue to receive support services including tutoring, academic program planning, follow up, and peer mentoring

San Diego Promise Program Status

- 2,000 students have currently signed up on the San Diego Promise Program Interest List
- Emails are being sent to all eligible new fall applicants
- Staff are working with students to clear requirements and complete orientation, assessment and educational planning
- The deadline to commit to participate in the San Diego Promise Program for 2018–2019 is August 3
- Comprehensive analysis of the 2017-2018 cohort is underway
- The District is continuing its fundraising efforts to support the program
