The San Diego Community College District (SDCCD) is among the largest of California's 73 community college districts. Annually, it provides education to approximately 90,000 students through its three credit colleges — San Diego City College, Mesa College, and Miramar College — and the seven noncredit campuses of the San Diego College of Continuing Education. The District also serves over 5,000 active-duty military personnel, veterans, and dependents. SDCCD is overseen by a five-member Board of Trustees, elected by local voters to four-year terms in even-numbered years.

The Board's four student members rotate, while the chancellor, the District's chief executive officer, is responsible for executing policies approved by the Board. The District encourages participatory governance, allowing all constituent groups to partake in planning processes. SDCCD credit colleges offer associate degrees, and career technical certificates are available through the College of Continuing Education and the credit colleges. These courses prepare students for university transfer or employment. Additionally, Mesa College offers a bachelor's degree in Health Information Management under California's Baccalaureate Program, and starting in fall 2024, City College will offer a four-year degree in Cyber Defense and Analysis. These courses prepare students for university transfer or employment. The District has active local industry, community, military, and educational partnerships to provide clear career pathways for students. In the 2022-23 fiscal year, the District and its graduates contributed \$4.5 billion to the regional economy. All SDCCD campuses aim to offer diverse learning experiences in a multicultural setting that meets community needs. Committed to innovation, access, and excellence, the District is working to redefine the community college experience.

#### **Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year**

The San Diego Community College District's \$1.555 billion Propositions S and N construction bond program has provided for new, state-of-the-art instructional and career training facilities, major renovations, public safety and accessibility enhancements, parking, and infrastructure projects at City, Mesa and Miramar Colleges, and seven Continuing Education campuses. All construction has been completed in accordance with the District's Green Building Policy and Major Renovation Standards. The policy calls for four key performance goals and includes formal pursuit of Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) certification. The District has obtained a total of 42 LEED certified buildings. The Prop S and N bond measures were closed out in December 2023. Currently the \$35,000,000 renovation to the historic ECC

Theater has been submitted to the State Architect for review and approval with an expected start of construction in the first part of 2025. The District has completed new Long Range Facilities Masterplans at each campus in anticipation of a new General Obligation Bond for November 5, 2024. In addition, the District has received approval of funding from the State of California for affordable student housing at City College and the design has begun for approximately 800 beds.

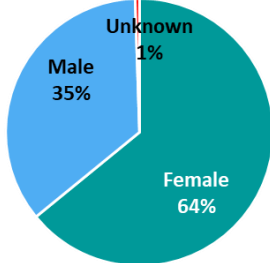

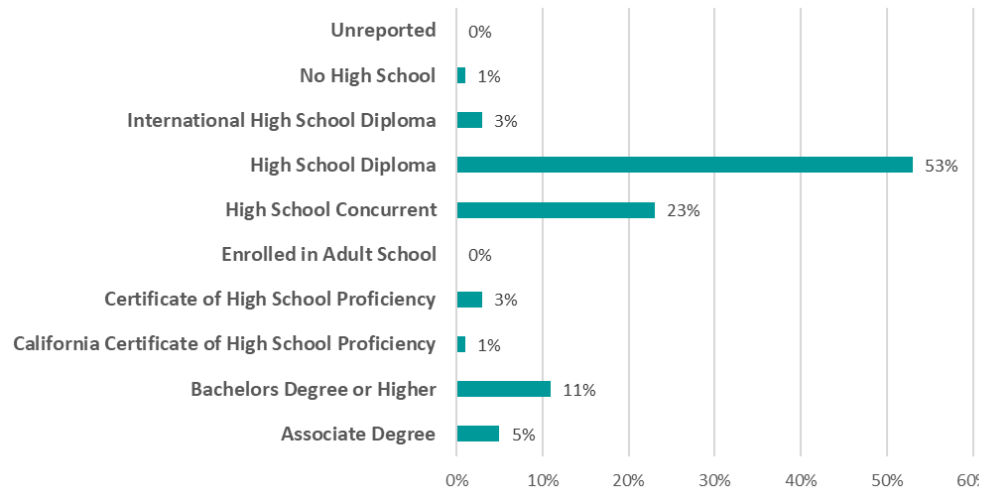

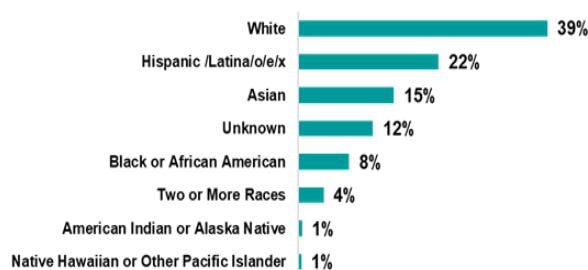

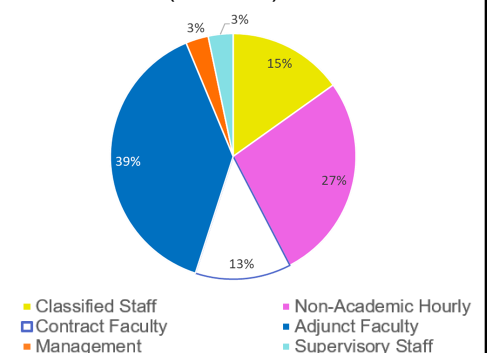

As the first community college in the region, San Diego City College has served our communities since 1914. As the District's flagship college, the multicultural campus is home to over 13,000 students each semester and offers more than 200 degrees and programs.

City College has as our core mission a commitment to social justice, educational equity, and academic excellence. Located in vibrant East Village, the 60-acre urban campus serves as the educational cornerstone of downtown San Diego. City College is a short walk from the City College Trolley Station, world renowned Balboa Park, the Gaslamp Quarter, Petco Park, and the San Diego Bay. The college also offers career technical training for in-demand fields such as cybersecurity, environmental control technology, biotechnology, computer information systems, digital music technology, and machine technology.

City College alums are employed throughout the region as engineers, technology specialists, business leaders, radio/TV broadcasters, linguists, cosmetologists, fitness specialists, and child development teachers, to name a few. Nursing graduates work in every major health care facility in the region. The visual and performing arts department also offers theater, dance, music, fine art, and award-winning graphic design and photography programs, which includes the Fine Art Gallery and Luxe Photography Gallery highlighting campus and community work. City College is the first choice for many for a quality education, exceptional student support services, and caring faculty and staff.

#### Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

In spring 2022, City College received \$344,000 in state funding to support planning efforts in the feasibility of constructing and offering affordable student housing on campus. In spring 2023, the college was awarded \$75 million that will be used toward construction. The current proposal is for a 300,000-sqft, 792-bed, seven-story student housing facility located at the corner of 16th and B streets. Anticipated completion is fall 2028. With the completion of the Propositions S & N projects at City College the campus is now focused on the new Facilities Plan which identifies campus facilities and infrastructure that will be constructed over the next 15-20 years to support the Educational Program with the passage of the Bond Measure in November 2024.

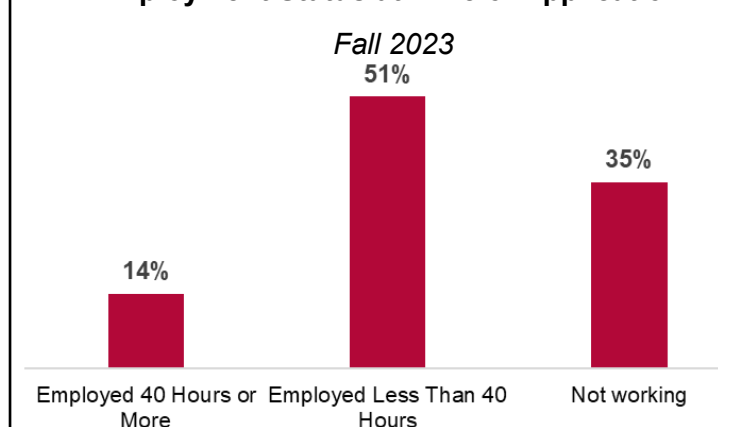

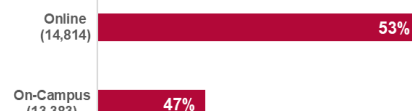
### Sections Offered by Mode of Instruction

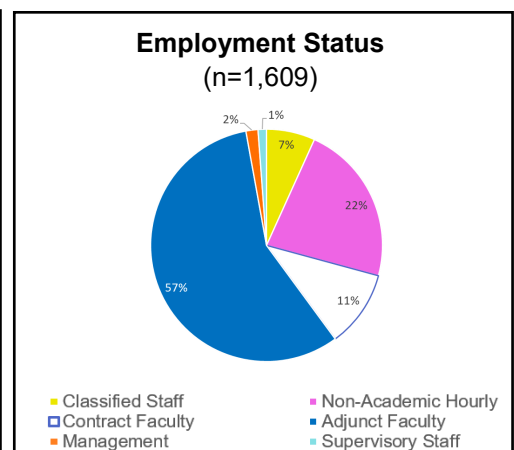
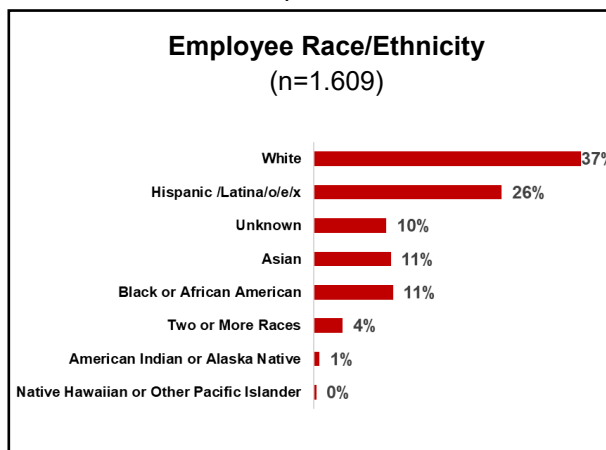
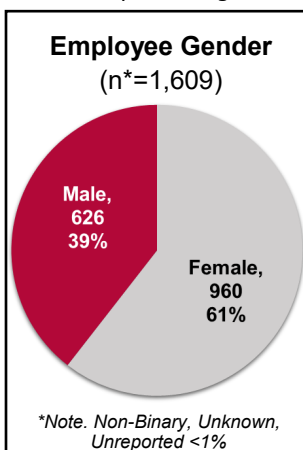

The diverse community of students, faculty, professional staff, and administrators at Mesa College collaborate to foster scholarship, leadership, access, and innovation in an inclusive learning environment. By promoting student learning and achievement that leads to degrees and certificates, transfer, workforce training, and lifelong learning, Mesa College empowers students to reach their educational goals and shape their futures. Among the largest community colleges in California, Mesa College serves nearly 30,000 students per year, of which 30% are first generation. Mesa College offers nearly 200 associate degrees and certificate programs, as well as a bachelor's degree in Health Information Management, which was one of the first four-year baccalaureate degrees offered by a California community college. Additionally, Mesa College ranks as San Diego's top transfer institution, supports 19 athletics teams — consistently among the most successful men's and women's intercollegiate athletic programs in the Pacific Coast Athletics Conference — is a proud Hispanic Serving Institution (HSI), an Asian American and Native American Pacific Islander Serving Institution (AANAPISI), and is a student-parent and military-friendly school that serves more than 2,500 veterans, active-duty service members, and their families. Mesa College offers multiple unique learning and support spaces to serve its diverse student population, including the AVANZA Engagement Center, Dreamer Resource Center, FAST/Foster Youth Center, Veterans Center, Pride Center, Honors Center, STEM Center and The Stand: The Dr. Pamela T. Luster Resource Center, a food and clothing pantry.

#### Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

Since 2021, Mesa2030, a comprehensive educational and facilities plan, has provided direction for how the campus facilities and infrastructure will grow to support educational programs over the next 10 years. Mesa2030 goals include designing programs and services that intentionally target a reduction in equity gaps, expand intersegmental pathways to create seamless transitions for students, and improve technology and facilities. With the support of a \$1.5 million federal grant, Mesa College opened its Family Resource Center inside the Library and Learning Resource Center to provide student-parents with a community space for workshops and to go with their children to study, as well as resources and necessities such as diapers and food. Expansion plans include an outdoor play area. Mesa College's participation in the Generation Hope's Family U has helped inform and develop intentional support and spaces for student-parents. As part of a \$1.7 million grant, the MESA (Mathematics, Engineering, Science, Achievement) Center was opened to assist students in those areas of study seeking to transfer to a four-year institution. To support more than 600 student-athletes participating on 19 Olympian teams, the OZone study area was created to provide centralized academic support, community, and a space to feel welcome and empowered. In the coming year, Mesa College is planning to unveil plans for the creation of new Affinity Spaces on the second floor of the Student Services Center. After completion of the Propositions S & N projects at Mesa College the campus is now focused on the future with Mesa2030 with the passage of proposed Bond Measure HH in November 2024.

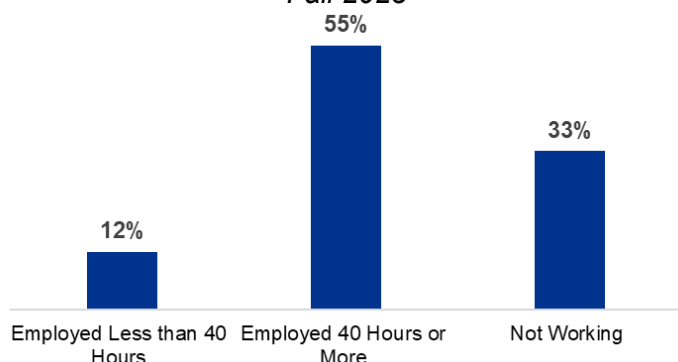

San Diego Miramar College is a comprehensive community college located in the Mira Mesa/Scripps Ranch area of San Diego. The college offers 172 degrees and certificates in 42 programs and a full range of transfer pathways to students looking to attend UC, CSU, and private universities. The College serves approximately 24,626 students annually. To enrich student life, Miramar College has established five intercollegiate sports teams and hosts the Phi

Theta Kappa International Honors Society. Partnerships with local industry and the City and County of San Diego help Miramar College prepare students for high demand and well-paying careers in the highly competitive labor market, including biotechnology, paralegal, aviation, automotive, diesel, and alternative fuels technologies. Miramar College has been home to the Southern California Biotechnology Center, Advanced Transportation and Technology Center, and San Diego Regional Public Safety Institute. Since 1969, the College has provided training for nearly all law enforcement officers and firefighters within San Diego County. The Public Safety Institute also trains EMTs and offers the only open water lifeguard degree program in the world. The College is proud of its state-of-the-art facilities, including those for departments such as science, automotive, aviation, heavy duty advanced transportation, fitness/athletics/health, humanities/arts and business/math classroom facilities, fire science/EMT training, MTS transit, and a 100,000 square foot library/learning resources center and student union to meet the comprehensive instructional and student service needs of its student body. Each spring, Miramar College awards approximately 1,100 associate degrees and 619 certificates.

### Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

Recently completed projects include an infrastructure landscape and pathway project on the west side of Parking Structure 4 allowing for a safe walking path connecting the south end of campus to the quad area and improving the look of that area. Smaller projects include providing ADA parking spaces under some type of shading near parking lot 1 or 2 as required and repairing smart meters to be able to track energy data on individual buildings.

After completion of the Propositions S & N projects at Miramar College the campus is now focused on the new Facilities Master Plan which identifies campus facilities and infrastructure that will need to be constructed over the next 15-20 years to support the Educational Program with the passage of the Bond Measure in November 2024.

Established in 1914, San Diego College of Continuing Education is among the oldest and largest noncredit institutions in the nation, serving approximately 30,000 students annually at seven campuses across the city, various community locations, and online. As the adult education arm of the San Diego Community College District, our students are among the most diverse in California—culturally, ethnically, and educationally—and our college is proud to be playing a preeminent role in alleviating poverty in our community.

San Diego College of Continuing Education commits to student success and community enrichment by providing tuition-free, accessible, equitable, and innovative quality education and support services to diverse learners in pursuit of lifelong learning, training, career advancement, and pathways to for-credit colleges. Programs address essential areas of adult education, including short-term career training in priority industry sectors; English as a Second Language; basic skills; an Emeritus program for those 55 years old or older; and Disability Support Programs and Services. The San Diego College of Continuing Education's career training programs alone contribute a quarter-billion dollars to the San Diego regional economy each year. Employers also benefit from customized workforce training through our Employee Training Institute (ETi). San Diego College of Continuing Education was one of the first noncredit institutions in the U.S. to be separately accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC), recognized for its impactful community presence, innovative programs, and commitment to transforming lives through accessible education and career pathways. #### Major Construction Projects/Improvements Underway or Planned for the Year

The state of California awarded San Diego College of Continuing Education a \$35 million grant to preserve and rehabilitate the historic theatre inside the landmark Educational Cultural Complex (ECC) in the Southeast San Diego community of Mountain View. Design work has wrapped up and construction is scheduled to start in early 2025. Other projects include a doubling the size of our award-winning welding program, thanks to a \$1.175-million in funds from a Texas-based nonprofit; long-overdue restroom upgrades at the ECC supported by \$500,000 in federal funds; a new A.I.R. Skills Technical Trades & Workforce Development Center that will directly address a growing statewide shortage of skilled workers in the trades and technical fields such as welding, green technology, electronics, and more; a new Research Center at the North City Campus; and new student Welcome Centers at all seven campuses. After completion of the Propositions S & N projects at the San Diego College of Continuing Education the campus is now focused on the future implementation of the Facilities Strategic Plan with the passage of proposed Bond Measure HH in November 2024.

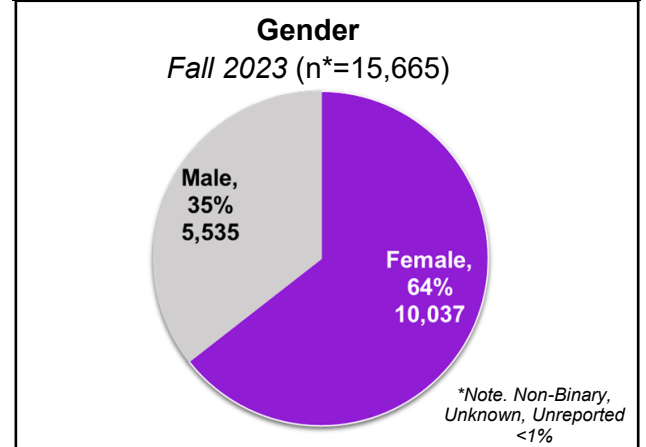

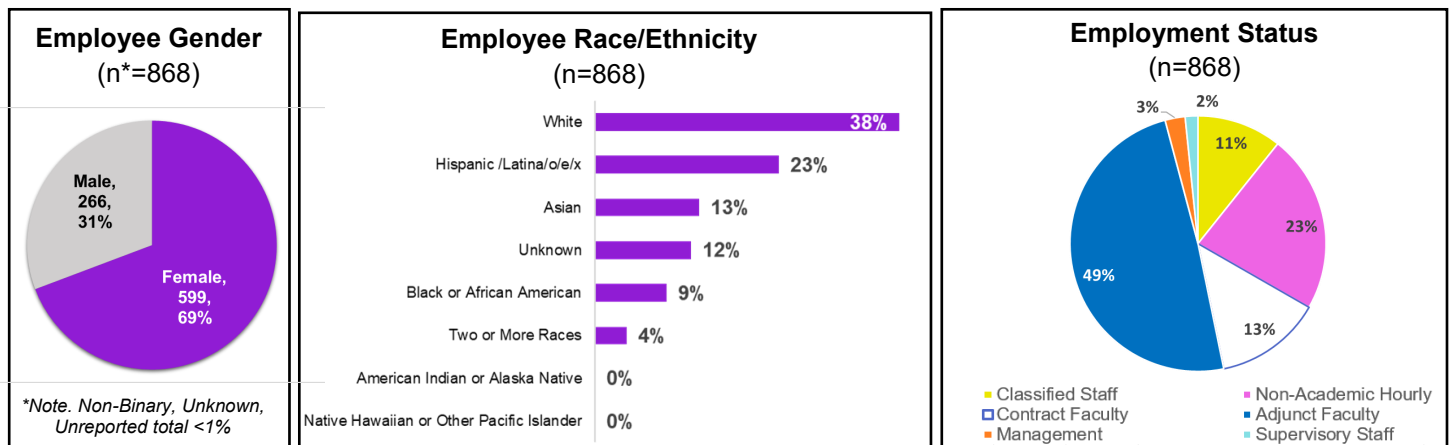

## Definition of Terms

### San Diego Community College District

**ACP:** Accelerated College Program. A dual enrollment program in which college courses are offered on high school campuses through an agreement between a high school and Mesa College. The goal of ACP is to accelerate degree completion for high-achieving students. High school students receive course credit for both high school and college transcripts.

**Annual Year (2023-2024):** For reporting purposes, the 2023-2024 Annual Year refers to Summer 2023, Fall 2023, Intersession 2024, and Spring 2024.

**Basic Skills Courses:** Courses in English and math that are one level or more below transfer level English and math. Also included are all ESOL courses.

**CCAP:** College and Career Access Pathways. A dual enrollment program established under California Assembly Bill 288 (2016) that serves students underrepresented in higher education. Under CCAP, a high school enters into an agreement with a community college to offer college courses on the high school campus. CCAP courses are closed to the public. High school students receive course credit for both high school and college transcripts.

**Concurrent Enrollment:** High school students enrolled in courses on the college campus outside of a CCAP or ACP agreement. This includes enrollments outside of any agreement. High school students receive course credit for both high school and college transcripts.

**Contact Hours:** Number of student contact hours for all methods of accounting including: WSCH, DSCH, PA, PO, PQ, IS, and IX.

**Course Completion Rate (Previously Retention Rate):** The percentage of students who complete a course with a grade of A, B, C, D, F, P, or NP out of total official census enrollments. Tutoring, challenge exams, and Credit for Prior Learning are all excluded.

**Degrees, Certificates, and Diplomas:** The number of degrees, certificates, and diplomas awarded in Summer 2023, Fall 2023, and Spring 2024.

**Enrollment - College:** The number of seats enrolled, or duplicated headcount. Drops, never attends, cancelled, Challenge Exams, Credit for Prior Learning, and tutoring classes are excluded.

**Enrollment - College of Continuing Education:** The number of seats enrolled, or duplicated headcount. Less than one attendance hour, drops, never attends, apprenticeship, non-state supported, and cancelled classes are excluded.

**First Generation Students:** Students who have identified themselves as the first generation in their family to attend college.

**FTES:** The total number of full-time equivalent students enrolled. Excludes non-state supported, cancelled, and tutoring classes. F-Factor is included.

**Headcount:** The individual count of students, or unduplicated headcount. Drops, never attends, Challenge Exams, Credit for Prior Learning, and cancelled classes are excluded. Apprenticeship, contract, and fee-only students are also excluded from SDCCE.

**San Diego Promise:** These numbers reflect unduplicated headcount for Fall 2023 Promise Participants. The Campus listed is the "home" campus where students received Promise services. This count includes 2023-2024 Promise participants that signed a commitment contract and participants from the 2022-2023 cohort that returned for a second year and signed a re-commitment contract.

**Students Receiving Financial Aid:** The number of students who were enrolled as of official census and received financial aid.

**Success Rate:** The percentage of students who complete a course with a grade of A, B, C, or P out of total official census enrollments. Tutoring, noncredit, Challenge Exams, Credit for Prior Learning, and cancelled classes are excluded.

**Transfers (SCFF Methodology):** The total number of students who transferred to a 4-year institution and were enrolled at an SDCCD college at any time within the prior academic year and earned 12 or more units in that year. Students with enrollment at SDCCD during the year of transfer are excluded.
