This course presents an overview of cultural anthropology using a comparative, cross-cultural approach. Emphasis is placed on the study of how various peoples around the world have adapted to their environments and developed behaviors to meet their biological, economic, psychological, social and political needs. 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| <p>107 Introduction to Archaeology</p> <p style="text-align: right;">3 hours lecture, 3 units Letter Grade or Credit/No Credit Option</p> <p>REQUISITES: <i>Advisory:</i> ENGL 051 & ENGL 056, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent or Assessment Skill Levels W5/R5. This course is an introductory study of the history and theory of archaeology. Emphasis is placed on the techniques of archaeological data collection and analysis, cultural innovations, reconstruction and interpretation of the past and Cultural Resource Management (CRM) work. 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| <p>150 Introduction to Chemical Dependency</p> <p style="text-align: right;">3 hours lecture, 3 units Grade Only</p> <p>REQUISITES: <i>Advisory:</i> ENGL 051 & ENGL 056, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent or Assessment Skill Levels W5/R5. Completion of or concurrent enrollment in PSYC 101 and SOCO 101, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent. <i>Limitation on Enrollment:</i> This course is not open to students with previous credit for BEHS 150 or PSYC 265: Introduction to Chemical Dependency. This course is a study of the basic concepts of chemical dependency. Emphasis is placed on understanding chemical dependency from an interdisciplinary level and on examining the socio-cultural patterns of dependency. Individual student's potential as a chemical dependency counselor will also be addressed. Students beginning the certificate program should start with this course. 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| <p>152 Physiology and Pharmacology of Psychoactive Drugs 3 hours lecture, 3 units Grade Only</p> <p>REQUISITES: <i>Advisory:</i> ENGL 051 & ENGL 056, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent or Assessment Skill Levels W5/R5. Completion of or concurrent enrollment in PSYC 101 and SOCO 101 each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent. <i>Limitation on Enrollment:</i> This course is not open to students with previous credit for BEHS 152 or PSYC 265: Physiology and Pharmacology of Psychoactive Drugs. This course is a study of the neurochemical, physical and mental effects of commonly used addictive psychoactive substances on the human biological system. 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| <p>154 Prevention, Intervention, Legal & Ethical Issues of Psychoactive Drug Use 3 hours lecture, 3 units Grade Only</p> <p>REQUISITES: <i>Advisory:</i> ENGL 051 & ENGL 056, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent or Assessment Skill Levels W5/R5. Completion of or concurrent enrollment in PSYC 101 and SOCO 101 each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent. <i>Limitation on Enrollment:</i> This course is not open to students with previous credit for BEHS 154 or PSYC 265: Prevention, Intervention, Legal & Ethical Issues of Psychoactive Drug Use. This course is a study of ethical and legal components of the chemical dependency field. Emphasis is placed on professional responsibility and patients' rights as they relate to various models of primary prevention and intervention. Topics also include community needs and resources and the influence of the media on prevention and intervention. This course is primarily intended for students pursuing the Alcohol and Other Drug Studies certificate. It is a required course for that program but this course is also intended for persons interested in how to keep individuals from developing alcohol and other drug problems and for persons wanting to learn how to help someone with an alcohol or drug problem when that person with the problem doesn't want help. 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| <p>133 Human Factors in Aviation</p> <p style="text-align: right;">3 hours lecture, 3 units Grade Only</p> <p>REQUISITES: <i>Advisory:</i> ENGL 051& ENGL 056, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent or Assessment Skill Levels W5/R5. <i>Limitation on Enrollment:</i> This course is not open to students with previous credit for AVIA 130. Research shows that more than 70% of aviation accidents are caused by human failures- -miscommunication or misinterpretation by people during critical phases of flight. This course provides an overview of the aeromedical, physiological, psychological, and group dynamics that can lead to these human failures. 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| <p>199 Instrument Ground School</p> <p style="text-align: right;">3 hours lecture, 3 hours lab, 4 units Grade Only</p> <p>REQUISITES: <i>Prerequisite:</i> AVIA 101 with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent. <i>Advisory:</i> ENGL 051 & ENGL 056 & MATH 032, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent or Assessment Skill Levels W5/R5/M20. This course provides an overview of the aeronautical knowledge required to successfully take the Federal Aviation Administration's (FAA's) pilot knowledge test for the instrument rating and flight training using an airplane flight simulator. Instruction includes basic instrument flight techniques, airplane instruments and systems, airspace and air traffic control, Federal Aviation Regulations, aeromedical factors and decision making, weather and weather services, basic instrument flight techniques, navigational aids, charts, and publications, instrument flight rules, procedures, and planning. This course provides an overview of the aeronautical knowledge and job requirements for a commercial airline pilot. Instruction includes advanced study of aerodynamics, large and multi-engine aircraft systems, performance and weight and balance, air traffic control and airspace, Federal Aviation Regulations, aeromedical factors and decision making, weather and weather services, and international flight planning, navigation, and procedures. AVIA 128 and AVIA 133 and AVIA 199 and AVIA 201, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent. A Commercial Pilot Certificate satisfies the Aviation advisories This course provides an introduction to methods of flight instruction by integrating learning theory with an in depth study of aeronautical science. The course includes a flight simulator lab in which students practice flight instruction techniques. Course topics include creating an optimum adult learning environment and teaching the principles of flight, airplane systems and performance, Federal Aviation Regulations, aeromedical factors, weather, and navigation. This course emphasizes the skills needed for conflict resolution and explores the environmental set-up and curriculum that promotes peaceful, cooperative and nonviolent play and interactions. Course content includes basic procedures of hair coloring, permanent waving, soft curl permanent waving, chemical straightening, and thermal pressing and curling. A review of the topics from COSM 60L is included to maintain subject matter mastery and to prepare students for client services. The Advanced Pharmacology for Vocational Nurses course is the second of two pharmacology courses in the Vocational Nursing program. It builds on the basic pharmacology course to enable the nursing student to develop a broader understanding of the nurse's role in medication administration and how medications are used to treat and prevent illnesses. Drug actions, interactions, side effects, therapeutic monitoring, and adverse reactions are discussed and related to pathophysiology. Drug categories not studied in the introductory course are explored to complete the study of pharmacology in healthcare.
