Techniques and workout routines from the beginning course are expanded into task-specific exercises related to work requirements in public safety occupations. In addition, students are introduced to fitness self-assessments in several fundamental physical conditioning categories. This course meets the Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) requirements for the Laws of Arrest portion of Section 832 of the California Penal Code. Topics include professional orientation, ethics, administration of justice components, California court system, discretionary decision making, community relations, introduction to law, laws of arrest, laws of evidence, communications, investigations, arrest, and control. <p>150 Introduction to Chemical Dependency</p> <p align="right">48 - 54 hours lecture, 3 units Grade Only</p> <p>REQUISITES: <i>Advisory:</i> English 47A or English 48 and English 49, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent or Assessment Skill Levels R5 and W5. This course is a study of the basic concepts of chemical dependency. Emphasis is placed on an analyzing of chemical dependency from an interdisciplinary level and on examining the socio-cultural patterns of dependency. Individual student's potential as a chemical dependency counselor is addressed. Students beginning the Alcohol and Other Drug Studies program should start with this course. <p>~153 Chemical Dependency Family Counseling Techniques</p> <p align="right">48 - 54 hours lecture, 3 units Grade Only</p> <p>REQUISITES: <i>Advisory:</i> English 101 with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent or Assessment Skill Levels R6 and W6. <i>Advisory: Completion of or concurrent enrollment in</i> Alcohol and Other Drug Studies 150 and Alcohol and Other Drug Studies 154, each with a grade of "C" or better, or equivalent. <i>Limitation on Enrollment:</i> This course is not open to students with previous credit for Alcohol and Other Drug Studies 158. This course is a study of the theories and practices related to the family dynamics involved when a member has a substance use problem. Emphasis is placed on therapeutic techniques designed to facilitate effective intervention strategies for the family as a system and for individuals within that system. Topics include assessment, family role delineation, family rules, co-dependency, open and closed family systems, intervention techniques and treatment modalities. This course is a study of ethical and legal components of the chemical dependency field. Emphasis is placed on professional responsibility and patients' rights as they relate to various models of primary prevention and intervention. Topics include community needs and resources and the influence of the media on prevention and intervention.
