One unit of credit may be earned for each 75 hours of paid employment or 60 hours of volunteer work. This course may be taken up to four times. However, the combined maximum credit for all Work Experience courses from all subject areas may not exceed 16 units. This course provides introductory-level students with beginning-level skills and practice in the use, handling, and care of firearms including the pistol and shotgun. Students develop basic techniques and skills from the introductory course to improve marksmanship. Other topics include specific types of firearms used in law enforcement; restrictions; safety precautions; and cleaning and transportation of firearms. Students must meet all applicable firing range safety requirements in order to participate in live fire activities. This course examines the causes and effects of violence in the lives of children and families. Emphasis is placed on the skills needed for conflict resolution and on the environmental set-ups and curricula that promote peaceful, cooperative, and nonviolent play and interactions. Other topics include the history, current legislation, reporting responsibilities, and identification of abuse.
