
Report on Student and Employee Diversity

Students, Employees and Service Area by Ethnicity

Districtwide, the number of both students and employees decreased by 5% and 7% from fall 08 to fall 09.

The most significant decline among students was Asian/Pacific Islanders (6%) and Whites (5%).

The largest decline among employees was African Americans (10%) and Asian/Pacific Islanders (6%). The decline among employees was largely from adjunct faculty (8%).



Students, Employees and Service Area by Ethnicity

Overall, the number of students increased less than 1% and employees decreased by 4% from fall 08 to fall 09.

The most significant decline among students was Asian/Pacific Islanders and Whites (7%, each).

The largest decline among employees was Asian/Pacific Islanders (13%) and African Americans (10%). Adjunct counseling had the largest decline (55%).

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

Overall, the number of students increased by 4% and employees decreased by 6% from fall 08 to fall 09.

Among employees, Whites had the largest decline (8%). The largest decline among employee groups was the adjunct faculty (10%).

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

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

Overall, the number of students decreased by 11% and employees decreased by 15% from fall 08 to fall 09.

The most significant decline among students was Asian/Pacific Islanders (8%) and African Americans (14%).

The largest decline among employees was Asian/Pacific Islanders (15%). Adjunct faculty had the largest decline (20%).

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

Students compared to Employee Groups by Ethnicity

Districtwide, the number of employees decreased by 7% from fall 08 to fall 09.

Faculty declined 7%, largely due to the decrease in adjunct faculty. Within the faculty group, Latinos declined by 5%, Whites by 7% and African Americans 10%.



Students compared to Employee Groups by Ethnicity

Overall, the number ^{70%} of employees decreased by 4% from fall 08 to fall 50% 09.

The employee decrease was largely due to the decline in adjunct counselors (55%). The decrease in faculty was less for Whites (2%) and Latinos (1%), but higher for African Americans (10%).

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

Overall, the number of employees decreased by 6% from fall 08 to fall 09.

Faculty declined 9%, largely due to the decrease in adjunct faculty (10%). The most significant declines among faculty were White and African American employees (8% and 7%, respectively).


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

Faculty declined by 6%, largely due to a decrease in adjunct faculty (6%). The decrease in faculty was greatest among the Latino and African American employees (19% and 14%, respectively).






Students compared to Employee Groups by Ethnicity

Students compared to New Hires by Ethnicity

The district hired 41 employees in 2009-10. Over half of the new hires were a result of in-sourcing Information Technology and 15% were internal hires.

Among the new hires, 18 (44%) were Classified and 23 (56%) were Management/ Supervisory.





Conclusions

- Although there has been an overall decrease in the number of employees due to a hiring freeze and retirements, the ethnic proportions for employees has remained relatively unchanged.
- Of the new hires, half were the result of in-sourcing Information Technology and 15% were from internal recruiting.
- Overall, the ethnic composition of students continues to reflect that of the service area.
- Districtwide, the Asian/Pacific Islander and Latino employee groups continue to be underrepresented when compared to the student groups. However, the African American student and employee groups are proportionally the same.
