



# African American/Black -Transfer

## Data Briefing

July 24, 2020

### Context

On June 5, 2020 the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) established an executive "Call to Action" to engage Districts around the state to review, implement, and adopt measurements to take actions against structural racism. The CCCCCO sent a [letter](#) defining the scope of the call to action. The San Diego Community College District Chancellor's Cabinet and Board of Trustees are examining current practices, support, and engagement to our African American Student population. The board requested an update on the **number of Transfers of American American/Black** students and the **top destinations**. The following graphs and tables summarize this information.

### Definition

**Transfer Volume:** The number of students who transferred from SDCCD to a four-year university who met two conditions:

- Completed 12+ transferable units at any community college within six years prior to transfers
- Enrolled at City, Mesa, or Miramar within two years prior to transfer.

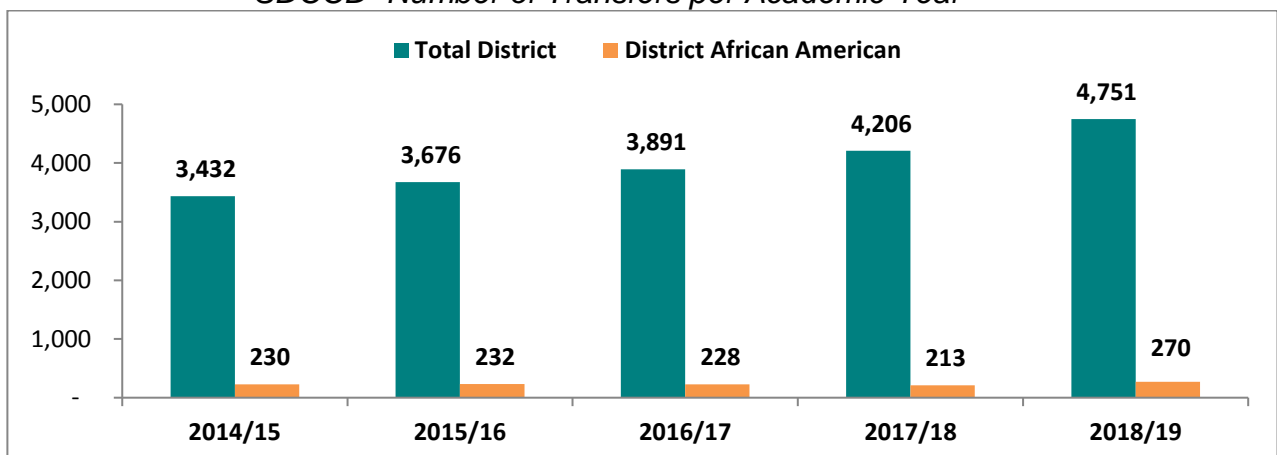

### Highlights

#### A. Transfer Volume

1. In the last five years, a total of 1,173 African American students transferred out of a total of 19,956 students. The African American students comprised about 6% of the transfers. The yearly transfer volume averages 235 African American out of 3,991 transfers from SDCCD colleges.

*SDCCD -Number of Transfers per Academic Year-*



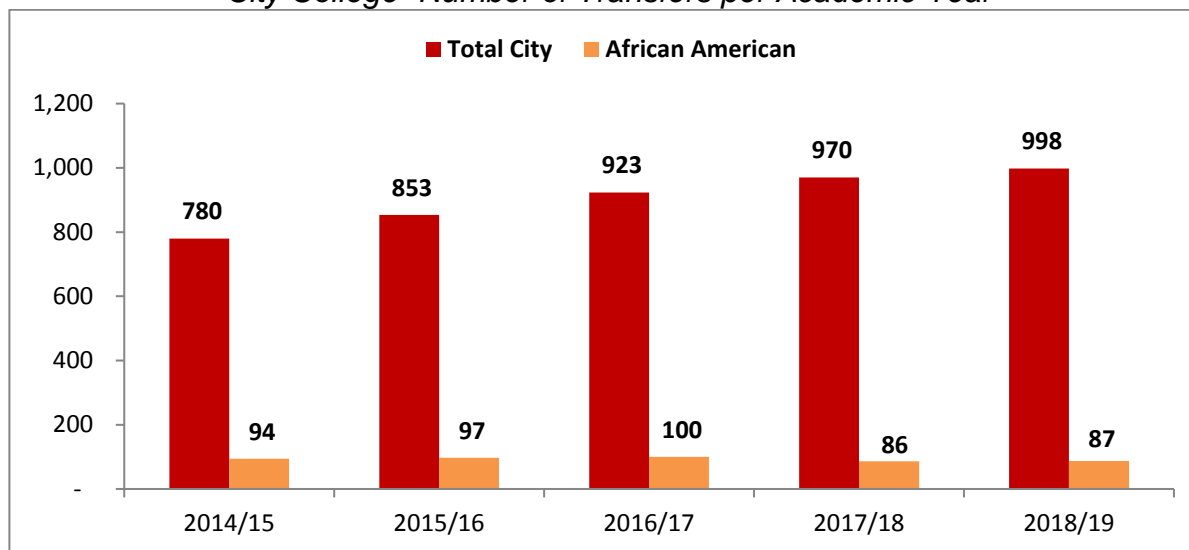
## African American Students- Transfers

2. Six to seven percent of African American Students transferred every year. There is a 17% increase of students transferring since 2014/15 (230) vs. 2018/19 (270). The transfer volume change is larger for the Total District (38%). African American increase (17%) is lower compared to Latinx (59%) Filipino (50%) and Asian/Pacific (48%).

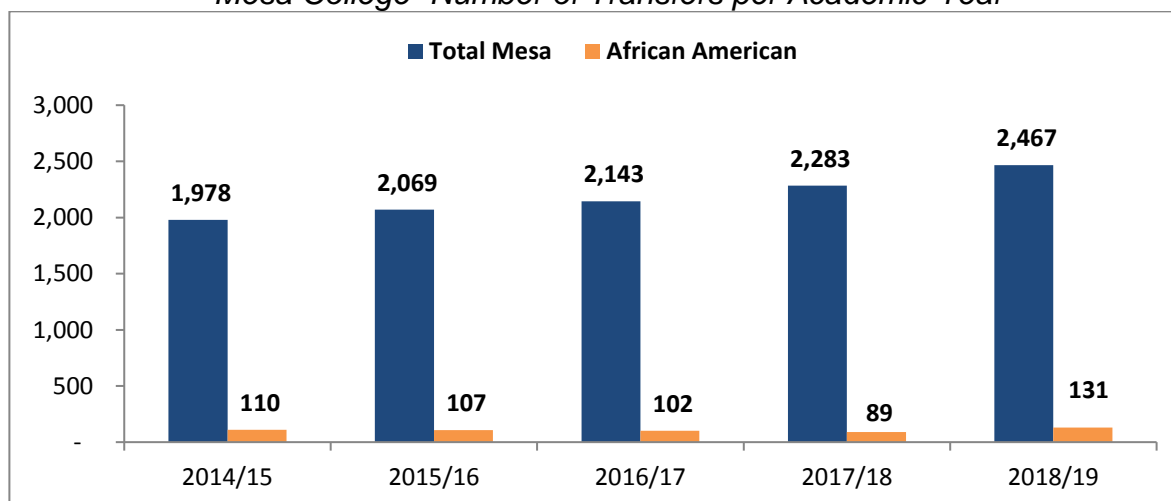
3. Five to seven percent of African American Students transferred every year from City College. There is a 7% decrease of students transferring since 2014/15 (94) vs. 2018/19 (87). The transfer volume change is larger for the total number of students who transferred from City College (28%).

*City College -Number of Transfers per Academic Year-*



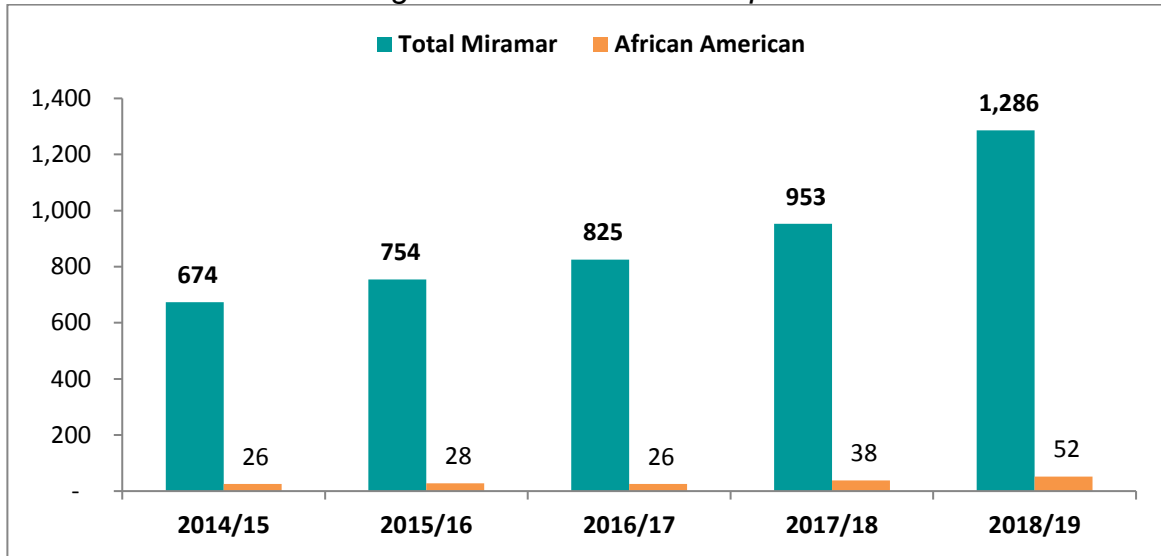
4. Four to six percent of African American Students transferred every year from Mesa College. There is a 19% increase of students transferring since 2014/15 (110) vs. 2018/19 (131). The transfer volume change is larger for the total number of students who transferred from Mesa College (25%).

5. Three to four percent of African American Students transferred every year from Miramar College. There is a 100% increase of students transferring since 2014/15 (26) vs. 2018/19 (52). The transfer volume change is smaller for the total number of students who transferred from Miramar College (91%).

### B. Top Five Transfer Destinations for African American/Black students

6. Three of the top five transfer destinations for district students are public institutions. San Diego State is the top destination for African-American students, with one-quarter to one-third of district transfers.

7. Three of the top five transfer destinations for City College students are public institutions. San Diego State is the top destination for African-American students, with one-quarter to one-third of transfers. Arizona State University is the only out of state institution in the top five.

## African American Students- Transfers

8. San Diego State is the top destination for African-American students from Mesa College, with one-fifth to one-third of transfers. There are two out of area institutions, CSU Long Beach and Arizona State University in the top five.
